

The Fédération des parents de la francophonie manitobaine (FPFM) conducted a province wide consultation for multilingual families from October to November 2020, to learn and discover what the biggest challenges are regarding raising francophone children in a multilingual household.

The goal is to develop resources, tools, and services to meet the challenges, needs and wishes of multilingual families in order to better support Manitoba families.

In the last few months, the FPFM has offered this consultation in 3 formats...

Survey Monkey:

The FPFM developed a survey through Survey Monkey to understand the perspective of the francophone and the non-francophone parent. It received 257 replies, 92 from non-francophone parents and 165 from francophone parents.


Zoom consultations:


The FPFM conducted 3 separate one-hour Zoom consultations on October 21st, October 28th, and November 2nd to hear the perspective of the English-speaking parent. There was a total of 20 participants, with a mixture of both men and women present.


1 on 1 consultations:

































- · Teaching my child to respect and learn about cultures, emphasize the importance of everyone's value

- I accept French to be spoken and I make an effort to speak certain phrases.



- People talk too fast in French






- Struggle with speaking French at home consistently

- Having to depend and wait on my spouse to translate French letters.




- Make it mandatory for schools to send emails in French and English
- I would like to have courses or online programs available to assist me in learning and growing my French language abilities










- Opportunities to meet and connect with other francophone families

- A list of good books in French (not just a translation)




- Learn French if you possibly can
- Immerse self in French (radio, television, etc.)












- Wasn't aware about them
